Who Are We and What Do We Do?

Education foundations nationwide were created in the late 1970's as public school budgets across the country were significantly reduced. To offset the serious financial crisis in our schools, and to bridge the financial gap between what was needed for our students and state and federal funding, the Holdrege Public Schools Foundation was formed in 1988 with a \$30,000 grant from the Phelps County Community Foundation for the purpose of establishing an endowment. For more than twenty years our community has responded to the district's needs with tremendous support, recognizing that in today's world, private funding is crucial for public education. Our Foundation Committee is comprised of three school board members, two staff members, and four community members who meet monthly and work on various projects throughout the vear.

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Sensory Integration

Elementary special education instructor Jena Deaver purchased a therapy net swing, body sock, season squeeze, and a handheld rotation board with grant funds.

These items were incorporated in her classroom to assist students. Mrs. Deaver stated, "The sensory integration room is used primarily to benefit students with learning disabilities such as autism spectrum, attention deficit, or behavioral disorders. HPS staff utilize sensory equipment to motivate, calm, or give students an active break. The staff works with an occupational therapist to continually provide students with disabilities an optimal learning environment. I am thankful for the support of the HPS Foundation to help our students succeed."

Ag Lab Provides New Opportunities

The HHS Ag Education Department is providing new opportunities for students with the purchase of a new CAD/CAM Plasma Cutting System for the Ag Lab. Students not only gain skills in computer aided drafting, design, fabrication, and metal cutting operations, but increase their employment potential and entrepreneurship skills. Allmand Brothers, a local business that utilizes this type of equipment, partnered with the HPS Foundation to provide funding to help the school district integrate this project into the curriculum. Donations from the Waller

family in memory of T. J. Waller, Central Valley Irrigation, Becton Dickinson, and Hawkins Manufacturing completed the funding for implementation of the project.

Teacher grant recipient Jeff Moore is excited about the opportunities this curriculum will provide students. He said that students enrolled in the program have already begun producing signage for the FFA Alumni Test Plot and Ag Mechanics class projects.

Future projects for agricultural education students include learning the software and creating parts for individual projects, as well as developing signage for the Holdrege FFA Test Plot and Farm Safety Camp.

Career Exploration

Julie Freburg has found a unique teaching assistant for her fourth grade career education unit. TB Bear goes home with students and visits a parent's local workplace. Parents take pictures of TB Bear at work with them, as well as recording in a journal to help students learn about their job duties, the type of education needed to do their job, and their likes and dislikes.

Mrs. Freburg said the original bears she used have been so popular over the past several years that they are worn out and ready to retire. The new bears are a welcome addition and are ready to help 4th graders gain an awareness for their future. She expressed appreciation to the HPS Foundation for providing funds to continue this successful learning unit.

iPads for Learning

Elementary staff member Deb Komenda utilized grant funds to purchase iPads for student use in the elementary classrooms. Applications such as Doodle Buddy, Rocket Math, and TimeReading for the iPads have been purchased to help students with reading, writing, and math. Students benefit by learning core educational components, as well as technology skills.

The iPads are used at all grade levels K-4. Dragon Dictation, for example, is being used with the 4th grade special education students to help them prepare for the state writing assessment. Some students experience struggles with the process of writing (correct grammar, spelling, etc.) and physically having to write. Dragon Dictation allows students to dictate a story into the iPad and the application writes their story for them. Students now view writing in a different way. Mrs. Komenda taught a lesson in Kara Taylor's 4th grade classroom using the application Doodle Buddy. This application allows students to practice spelling words using a tactical approach to learning. The iPads have also been used in the 1st grade classrooms to allow students to create a story using their own pictures and recordings using an application called Story Kit.

When students are exposed to technology, such as the iPad, they can

see learning as an extension to the classroom. They are not limited to what a textbook can provide. Students get excited to learn something new because of the use of technology. Deb Komenda would like to see more applications purchased for classroom use that align to the current curriculum and enhance student learning for

the future. Since the state assessments are online, adding iPads to learning can help students get the most out their testing experience.

Students Build Robots

Members of the high school robotics club are hard at work on their competition robots. The robots must be able to pick up 6-inch bean bags and place them in goals around the competition area. Two robots are being constructed to move about the play arena. One model uses a tread conveyor system to pick up the bean bags and the other uses a 6-bar lift system to raise and lower the bean bags. There is a practice scrimmage December 8th at CCC in Hastings which will help the teams test and further prepare for a competition in January.

Grant recipients Don Kosmicki and Terry Shield indicated that grant funds have provided for updated controllers and heavier stronger gears and motors to help students be more competitive and to allow the robots to be more sophisticated. The students have incorporated the new parts into this year's robots and are looking forward to seeing how their ideas and the new technology perform in competition.

Communication & Design with iPads

Terry Shield will begin working with 6th grade students next semester to implement a new communication and design project utilizing 30 iPads purchased with the help of grant funds from the HPS Foundation and


the Phelps County Community Foundation Future Fund, in addition to donations from the Middle School Parent Association, Student Council, and Climate Committee.

In the project, the students will be asked to come up with a new cereal name, a new company name, design a new cover, back and side panels for the new cereal packaging. At the conclusion of the graphics design phase, the students will design and produce a digital commercial using iPad software. Students will record their voices, add sound effects, and burn a CD advertising their cereal.

At the conclusion of the project, instructor Don Kosmicki will select some of the designs and radio advertisements to use in the video production class. Students will produce a combination video and audio commercial advertising the new cereal.

Mr. Shield stated, "Students will use digital media and environments to communicate and work collaboratively, to support individual learning, and contribute to the learning of others. I am looking forward to the challenge of using this new technology provided for by the generous grant we received. "

Future plans include using the iPads in other classes, adding applications, and developing more activities. The iPads will allow teachers to continually expand technological reach and explore new uses and experiences.

Document Camera Increases Student Comprehension

Kindergarten students in Nancy Nelson's classroom are benefitting from grant funds used to purchase a document camera to enhance instruction. Mrs. Nelson uses the camera, in conjunction with a computer and Smartboard, to show objects in an enlarged version, which lets students view both words and details in illustrations with better clarity.

Mrs. Nelson said that she is still exploring new uses of the camera. It allows her to take pictures of anything placed under it and she can save those images in her computer. The possibilities are endless ... math manipulatives for demonstrating grouping, patterns, addition/subtractions, coins, and shapes; science experiments; workbook pages; and more.
