At the end of the 1st Semester, December 20, students will be given a semester grade only. Credit will be awarded based on the semester grade and attendance. Students will not be given a 2nd Quarter grade as the semester grade is the grade the students have earned for the semester. Honor roll will be determined using semester grades only.

HEALTH UPDATE!

With flu season in full swing, school nurse Keegan Anderson, RN reminds parents and students to stay on guard. Influenza is a respiratory virus with symptoms such as fever, cough, sore throat, body aches, stuffy/runny nose, headaches, and fatigue. The flu is spread through droplets from coughing, sneezing,



and talking so hand hygiene is vital. Also, please do not send students back to school until they have been fever free (without Tylenol or Ibuprofen) for at least 24 hours. Flu season begins in October, but it is not too late to receive your vaccination if you have not done so. The CDC recommends everyone age 6 months and older receive an annual flu shot.

All Students

- -Peer tutors for a variety of subjects are available to HHS students. Stop by the guidance office for more information.
- -Schedule changes for second semester can be made at any time. Students are encouraged to make any changes as soon as possible. The last date to make changes will be Wednesday, January 9.
- -All students are reminded that the guidance office offers a variety of services to help all students. Everyone is welcome to stop in for assistance.

Seniors

- -If you haven't made your final decision about your plans for next year, now is the time! Make your final campus visits to narrow and clarify your choice.
- -Families of seniors: If you've not already done so, the FAFSA should be filed as soon as possible using your 2017 tax information. If you need assistance, Education Quest offers free help with the FAFSA. Their office in Kearney can be reached at 800-666-3721.
- -Please visit the guidance page at <u>www.dusters.org</u> for important information including an up-to-date scholarship list. This list has also been shared with all seniors in the Google drive. Information will continue to be added to these lists as we are made aware of scholarship offerings. There will soon be a Google Classroom available to all seniors that will have current and ongoing scholarship information.
- -Kara Faber from the Phelps County Community Foundation will be in Mrs. Olson's English classes during periods 1, 2, 3, and 7 on Tuesday December 4th to inform students about the many scholarships offered through the Foundation. She will go over the application process and all seniors should make arrangements to attend one of the sessions even if they don't have English during one of those periods.
- -The Susan Thompson Buffett Scholarship is a wonderful opportunity for students who qualify based on figures from the FAFSA with plans to attend a public college in Nebraska. This application is due February 1 and is lengthy and requires an essay--students should be working on it now! More information is available at www.buffettscholarships.org
- -Cut-off dates for scholarships at many colleges and universities will be sometime in February.
- -Colleges will be sending important information to their incoming students regarding housing applications so be watching email for that.
- -Seniors planning to enter the workforce upon graduation should be polishing their resume in order to be ready to make applications.

Juniors

- -The annual junior career day is on Wednesday, December 12. Students will tour Phelps Memorial Health Center, Allmand Brothers, and Becton-Dickinson. Following lunch the results of their ASVAB interest inventory will be shared and explained to them.
- -The ACT is offered seven times per year. College bound students are encouraged to take it 3-4 times to maximize their opportunities to get the best possible score. HHS is a site for the October and December national test dates. All juniors will be taking the April 2 statewide test. This test is provided at no cost to the students and provides college-reportable scores. Registration information for all national testing dates is available at www.act.org.
- -Juniors will begin working on ACT preparation in math and English classes after the new year. In addition, the ACT prep program On To College with John Baylor is available to any student who wants to do extra work preparing for the ACT. HHS makes On To College available to students for \$20.
- -Juniors should begin thinking about their college selection process. Spring is an excellent time to visit colleges. HHS allows juniors and seniors in good standing to have a total of three days to visit colleges. Stop by the Guidance Office if you need help arranging college visits.

From the Holdrege Chapter of the National Honor Society.



Below are the selection procedures for the Holdrege High School chapter of the National Honor Society. It must be noted that nationally only about 10% of students qualify for membership. There are no quotas for membership in the National Honor Society, but is not uncommon for less half the students with the required GPA to be invited for membership. The selection procedures are dictated by the National Charter and the High School faculty has very little to say about how the procedure works.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY SELECTION PROCEDURE

It first must be noted that selection into the National Honor Society is a privilege, not a right. It is a misconception that students are inducted in the National Honor Society solely because of grades. Scholarship is just one of the four criteria that a student must excel in. The students must also **excel** in Service, Leadership, and Character as perceived by the high school faculty. Students who are average or weak in any of the four criteria may not be invited for membership.

While there are no set minimum or maximum number selected every year, it is not uncommon that less than half of the students with a GPA of 3.50 or greater are inducted as members. Again, students must excel in all four areas of the National Honor Society, Scholarship, Service, Leadership, and Character.

The Holdrege Chapter of the National Honor Society selection Procedure:

- 1. At the end of the first quarter juniors and seniors with a GPA of 3.50 or greater will be identified.
- 2. A letter will be sent to these students asking them to fill out a Student Activity Information form.
- 3. Only students returning the Student Activity Information form by the date listed on the form will be considered for membership.
- 4. The faculty will then rate the students who returned the Student Activity Information form in the areas of Service, Leadership, and Character. The students have already met the minimum requirement for Scholarship in order to receive the Student Activity Information form. These ratings will be based on the content of the Student Activity Information form and on the faculty's acquaintance with the student.
- 5. A council made up of five faculty and non-voting NHS advisors will determine which students will be admitted into the Holdrege Chapter of the National Honor Society. The Principal appoints the faculty council and the NHS advisors.

The criteria for selection into the Holdrege Chapter of the National Honor Society include but is not limited to the following:

SERVICE

- a. Is willing to uphold scholarship and maintain a loyal school attitude.
- b. Participates in some outside activity: Girl Scouts; Boy Scouts; church groups; volunteer services for the aged, poor, or disadvantaged; family duties.
- c. Volunteers, dependable, and well-organized, gladly available and willing to sacrifice to offer assistance.
- d. Works well with others and is willing to take on difficult or inconspicuous responsibilities.
- e. Cheerfully and enthusiastically renders any requested service to the school.
- f. Is willing to represent the class or school in inter-class and interscholastic competition.
- g. Does committee and staff work without complaint?
- h. Shows courtesy by assisting visitors, teachers, and students.

LEADERSHIP

- a. Is resourceful in proposing new problems, applying principles, and making suggestions.
- b. Demonstrates initiative in promoting school activities.
- c. Exercises influence on peers in upholding school ideals.
- d. Contributes ideas that improve the civic life of the school.
- e. Is able to delegate responsibilities.
- f. Exemplifies positive attitudes.
- g. Inspires positive behavior in others.
- h. Demonstrates academic initiative.
- i. Successfully holds offices or positions of responsibility, conducting business effectively and efficiently, and without prodding, demonstrate reliability and dependability.
- j. Is a forerunner in the classroom, at work, and in school or community activities?
- k. Is thoroughly dependable in any responsibility accepted.

CHARACTER

- a. Takes criticism willingly and accepts recommendations graciously.
- b. Consistently exemplifies desirable qualities of behavior (cheerfulness, friendliness, poise, stability).
- c. Upholds principles of morality and ethics.
- d. Cooperates by complying with school regulations concerning property, programs, office, halls, etc.
- e. Demonstrates the highest standards of honesty and reliability.
- f. Shows courtesy, concern, and respect for others.
- g. Observes instructions and rules, punctuality, and faithfulness both inside and outside the classroom.
- h. Has powers of concentration and sustained attention as shown by perseverance and application to studies.
- i. Manifests truthfulness in acknowledging obedience to rules, avoiding cheating in written work, and showing unwillingness to profit by the mistakes of others.
- j. Actively helps rid the school of bad influences or environment.
